Madrasah Dress Code

At Madrasah Al-Farouq we believe it is essential to follow the Sunnah and learn about modesty (Haya) from a young age, to form a habit for the future.

Children are encouraged to take pride in their appearance, which promotes modesty and enhances confidence.

Correct Madrasah uniform must be worn at all times & parents are requested to cooperate with the Madrasah by ensuring correct attire is worn at all times.

All boys should wear a kurta or jubbah with trousers. They must also wear a Topi (skull cap). Other forms of hats like caps, outdoor hats or woolly hats are not acceptable in Madrasah.

Please ensure that their jubbah/ trousers are above the ankles.

Girls are required to wear a black jubbah with long sleeves and a Black/White

Burkha (no scarves please, due to sharp pins). Burkha should be large enough to cover the hair. No hair should be visible.

To promote personal safety, Jewellery must not be worn at Madrasah. No facial piercings will be allowed. A single stud earring will be allowed in each ear. Watches maybe worn if responsibility is personally accepted.

- No extremes of hair fashion are allowed, such as multi-coloured hair dyes, tram lines and other patterns cut into the hair or eyebrows.
- No acrylic nails, varnished nails or make-up.
- Jewellery items are strictly prohibited for male pupils, and will be confiscated.

Respecting your parents is very important as they are the ones who brought you into this world.



- Do not raise your voice when talking to them
- Always make Du'aa for them in the following words "o my sustainer, show mercy to them as they brought me up when I was a child"

Respect For Teachers



“The seeking of knowledge is obligatory for every Muslim.”

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Respect is a way of treating or thinking about something or someone’s feelings, wishes or desires etc. If you respect your teacher, you admire them & treat them well.

People respect others who are impressive for many reasons. We show teachers respect because they are our source of knowledge & they encourage us to lead a better life. Sometimes they may be the only person to listen to our thoughts.

Prophet Muhammad (s.a.w) said “Allah has angels & all those in the heavens & on earth, even ants in their hills & fish in the water, call down blessings on those who instruct others in beneficial knowledge.”

(Al-Tirmidhi)

Abdullah Ibn Abbas was the cousin of our Prophet Muhammad (s.a.w). When Abdullah was young our Prophet would

make Du'aa for him asking Allah to give Abdullah a deep understanding of Islam & to let him understand things well.

Often as a child Abdullah would spend time in the company of our Prophet (s.a.w). When he was 13 our Prophet (s.a.w) passed away. Abdullah would then sit with the Sahabah & he would listen to the stories & teachings of our Prophet (s.a.w). Often he would travel distances to learn a single Hadith.

In one visit, he went to see a Sahabi who was asleep at the time. Abdullah did not want to disturb him so he sat outside. When the Sahabi woke up he asked “why did you not wake me up? You are the cousin of the Prophet (s.a.w) & we would have come to see you if you had asked!”

Abdullah Ibn Abbas explained that he was the student & that the Sahabi was the teacher, so he did not want to disturb or inconvenience him.

Ways to Show Respect to Your Teachers

- Pay attention to the teacher
- Do your work at the correct time
- Do your homework
- Do not be late to class
- Do not ignore the teacher
- Do not answer back
- Do what is asked of you
- If you do not understand, ask politely
- Punctuality on lessons
- Listen attentively and follow instructions
- Raise your hand, do not shout out
- Make Du’aa for your teachers
